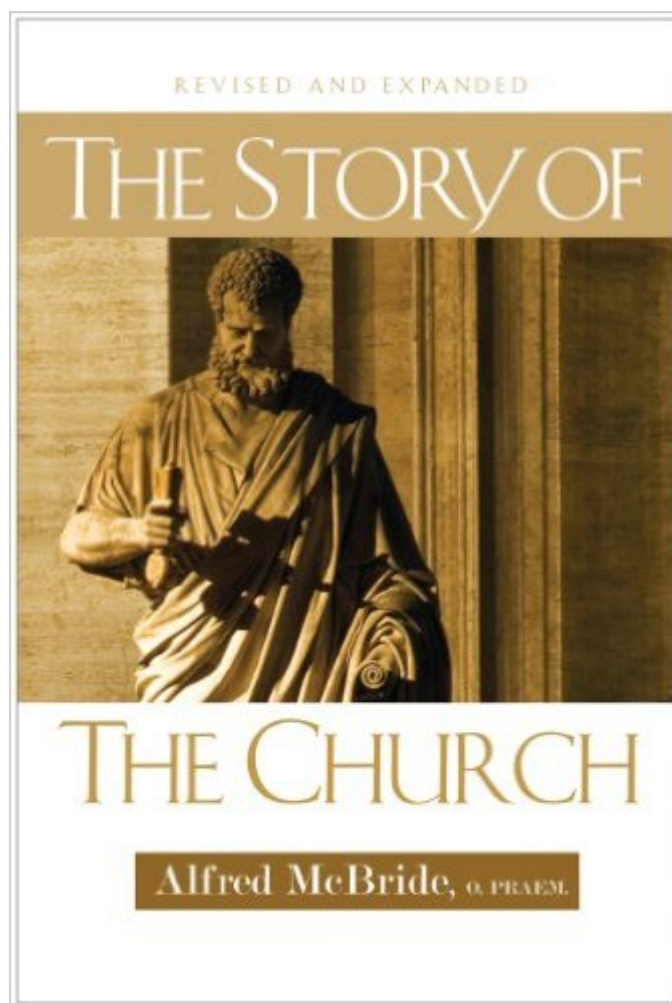


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The Story Of The Church: Revised And Expanded

Although the information in McBride's book is good, the narrative sections are, generally, painful to read. In a book in which exposition is really important, narrative is a truly a poor choice, and using dialogue to convey large chunks of information is particularly hard to digest, particularly when the speakers all sound like people we might meet in our own day and age. For example, two 5th century

Eastern Orthodox members, Frank and Laura (names I don't expect we'd find in 5th Century Constantinople), engage in a conversation about the fall of Rome. At one point, Frank remarks, "Well, you know, when Constantine came here to the East a century ago, he pretty much left a power vacuum in the West. The ruling families who were left soon died out. And the new wave of barbarians, who had no respect for the world they were invading, didn't help matters." Laura responds, "Is there any help for the West, Frank?" After two pages of this kind of stilted, overlaid dialogue, the two part with Frank being invited over to dinner with a group of friends "hungry for news about the West. The dialogue concludes this way: "I'd love to. "Say about eight?" "Wonderful, see you then." In an imaginary interview, with the 16th century theologian, Erasmus, is asked why he has gradually withdrawn his support from Martin Luther. He sums up his objections with this 16th century linguistic wonder: "He called the pope the Antichrist, the bishops seducers and Rome an abomination before God. That was a bit much." Clearly, while McBride has solid knowledge of church history, he has a tin ear when it comes to dialogue.

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
